Dear Friends:

For more than 165 years, since its founding in 1858, YW-NYC has been an advocate and provider of opportunities and services for women in New York. One of the many qualities that has enabled us to remain steadfast over the decades in our endeavors to advance women and girls is our ability to adapt to the needs of the day and change with the times.





As the nation grew from the Civil War, Reconstruction, the Industrial Era, Women's Suffrage, the Great Depression, and World War II to Civil Rights and the Women's Liberation Movement, YW-NYC was at the forefront of championing change during these critical periods. By providing vocational and educational opportunities and independent living spaces in the 1870s, we empowered women to challenge traditional expectations and work and live on their own. By becoming the first agency to adopt an interracial charter in 1889, we set lifting up women of color and eliminating racism as founding tenets of our work. By offering our first English as a Second Language programs in 1909, we helped to welcome new arrivals to the city with the resources to become self-sufficient. And with our childcare and parenting programs beginning in the 1970s and 80s, we strengthened new mothers' resolve, enabling them to balance work and home life.

Today, we carry this vision forward by centering the cultures and priorities of the communities we serve. With their direction, we continue to identify new ways to foster leadership, self-confidence, empowerment, and independence while eliminating racism, empowering women, and promoting peace, justice, freedom, and dignity for all in an ever-changing world. This report highlights our achievements and successes in 2023 and the programs and people championing change at YW-NYC right now.

2023 was a year of firsts for YW-NYC, as well as a time to revisit and reinvent valued traditions. Through the steer of our student ambassadors in our Girls Initiatives program and staff, we launched successful events like the Hackathon, Girls Symposium, and holiday clothing and hygiene drive. With support from our esteemed Board of Directors and our new Young Professionals Leadership Council, we raised nearly \$400,000 at our 165th anniversary gala. We began expanding our Girls Initiatives programs and added new schools in Harlem to our Out-of- School-Time program roster. And we brought on new program and leadership staff tasked with increasing our impact and improving our services for NYC's youth.

The change we have championed in 2023 has positioned us well to more deeply engage and support the children, young women, and gender non-conforming youth we serve, most of whom are youth of color, in their journeys to become change-makers, community-builders, and legendary leaders. Established in 1858, YWCA of the City of New York (YW-NYC) was the nation's first YWCA association and was instrumental in the development of a global network of nonprofits dedicated to the social and economic advancement of women and girls. By offering vocational trainings, the first employment bureau for women, educational opportunities, childcare and other resources for mothers and survivors of domestic violence, as well as women-centered professional networking forums, YW-NYC has been a pioneer for social change since its inception.

Today, YW-NYC is helping a new generation of children, young women, and gender non-conforming youth in New York City reach their full potential while navigating the intersections of race, class, and gender.

WHO WE ARE



A DEEP DIVE WITH:

NAYIRA POLANCO

Born and raised in Santiago, Dominican Republic until the age of twelve, Nayira Polanco's earliest experiences with education came from her parents and aunties who taught her math, reading, and life-skills through the family's day-to-day activities in the kitchen, on the farm, and at the river. Her father, an architect, and her mother, a seamstress, stressed the importance and value of creating things of function and beauty using her hands. The confines of a classroom and the structure of formal education were not a regular part of her reality until she moved from her spacious Dominican farm to the crowded streets of Washington Heights in New York City. Frustrated with the limitations and strict rules in her schools, Nayira focused her energies on visual arts and eventually enrolled in the Fine Arts and Photography program at SUNY New Paltz in upstate New York. New Paltz was a good fit, allowing her to return to the comforts of working on a local farm. There, she had the opportunity to contribute to the arts program at a nearby Montessori school where she was inspired to see that encouraging independence and self-expression was built into the curriculum, even for the youngest students.



Starting as an art teacher in one of New York
City's public elementary schools, Nayira launched
a career in education that led her to roles in
school administration, city government agencies,
and nonprofit social service organizations. The
throughline in her career has always been youth
empowerment and supporting underserved
communities through holistic and culturally
responsive service models, which brought her to the
doors of YW-NYC in September of 2023.

Nayira felt strongly that the key to her success managing afterschool and summer camp group leaders, specialists, and program directors, as well as school administration and local government relationships across multiple public primary and middle schools and school districts was to ensure alignment on the idea that students, staff, and administrators have a collective responsibility and shared power to make society better. Nowhere is this more apparent than in YW-NYC's Girls Initiatives program, operated out of YW-NYC's Family Resource Center in Hell's Kitchen. Serving high school girls and gender-nonconforming youth across the five boroughs, programs are designed to expose young women to life skills and college and career readiness concepts such as STEM, financial literacy, social justice, and leadership. But the real appeal of the program is the community it fosters, bringing a diverse array of students together from all over the city in a safe space designed with their needs in mind and open to them as soon as they get out of school. Nayira has made this her pet project, reviving and expanding programming and developing the space with a growing reputation for centering the needs and interests of its members,

and nurturing the next generation of change-makers.

I want to open doors for the girls in our programs. I want them to understand the power of their voices, challenge power dynamics, and advocate for change, Nayira says. I want to create spaces where children and youth can be joyful, authentic, celebrated, and respected as equal partners in their education.



WHEREWEWORK

2023 marked significant milestones for YW-NYC. In our 165th anniversary year, we expanded our impact across New York City. With the addition of two new public schools, our Out-of-School-Time (OST) network now includes eight public schools. Additionally, we renovated our Girls Initiatives Center and grew our girls programming, allowing us to reach more young people than ever, fostering their growth and potential through vital educational opportunities.




OUT-OF-SCHOOL TIME

YW-NYC's OST programming offers a supportive environment for 2,000 K-8 students across Brooklyn and Harlem. Our diverse team of educators and licensed teachers partner with schools, families, and community leaders to provide enriching activities. Through our after-school and summer programs, students enhance their academic and social skills, gain confidence, and develop leadership abilities, fostering a strong sense of responsibility and civic engagement.

HOMEWORK HELP & LITERACY

Under the guidance of our Senior Program Director and Education Specialist, YW-NYC developed an **English Language Arts** curriculum that enhances reading, vocabulary, and writing skills through a mix of visual stories, movies, books, folk tales, and spoken word. Integrated into our literacy activities is our commitment to anti-racism, ensuring lessons promote equity and inclusion.

Additionally, we provide comprehensive academic support, including homework help and targeted assistance for students facing learning challenges. In partnership with P.S 90 Edna Cohen School, from February to May 2023,






Students engaged in weekly cooking lessons, learning about food and wellness. Guided by a specialist, they explored diverse cuisines and honed cooking techniques. Alongside culinary exploits, students ventured into music, focusing on 50 years of hip-hop as the theme of last year's **Summer Rising** program. They mastered themes like tempo and composition, crafting musical solutions for real-world issues and seamlessly integrating artistic skills into their learning journey.

Students actively engaged in initiatives aimed at improving their school, after-school, and community environments. They conducted research on **teen activists** who catalyzed change in their communities, studying the processes they employed and exploring how these strategies could be adapted and applied to their own local projects.





GIRLS INITIATIVES

YW-NYC Girls Initiatives programming, located in Hells Kitchen, empowers young women through after-school programs in leadership, college and career, mental health, and STEAAM fields. In 2023, they served over 500 girls across all five boroughs of NYC.



LEADERSHIP & ADVOCACY

YW-NYC's leadership programs develop young women's advocacy, leadership, and social justice skills. Programs include **Bystander Intervention Training** and our new girls-led **Ambassador** program focusing on community service projects. In 2023, girls in the Bystander program trained members in the community on how to be a good upstander in situations of racial and gender bias. Additionally, at the culmination of the year, our Ambassadors orchestrated a Coat & Hygeine Drive for women in need in our NYC community.

COLLEGE & CAREER READINESS

YW-NYC equips girls for their academic and professional futures. Our **College and Career Readiness** program workshops, networking events, and college visits, all designed to guide participants through the complexities of application processes, financial aid, scholarships, and career exploration. In the summer and fall of 2023, the girls participated in college and career workshops which provided them hands-on experience through internships with partners like **New York School of Interior Design (NYSID)** and **Sullivan & Cromwell**.



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
STEAVAM

YW-NYC's STEAAM programs provided hands-on educational training, networking opportunities with women experts and leaders, and immersive experiences focusing on Science, Technology, Engineering, Advocacy, Arts, and Math. In 2023, YW-NYC expanded **Geek Girls** to a year-long program where girls learn intensive coding and work toward projects that address a community need. This culminated in their participation in our inaugural **Hackathon**, hosted by Betterment in NYC.



How has your participation in the Ambassador program changed how you see yourself and your role in your family, community, and the world?



The Student Ambassadors program has changed the way I view myself. I now realize how much potential I have; I can do anything I imagine. I can voice my ideas and my beliefs to my community and be heard. What we do here is listen to each other and then face any injustice or problem head-on altogether, so no one has to feel alone within this community.

EVENT HIGHLIGHTS



SALUTE GALA

In October 2023, YW-NYC gathered in-person for our annual SALUTE Gala to celebrate the our 165th anniversary of service to New York. The event honored incredible leaders, including Changemaker Champion Janessa Cox-Irvin, Global Head of Diversity, Equity & Inclusion and Corporate Citizenship at AllianceBernstein, as well as YW-NYC's long-time advocate and retiring board chair, Tracy Richelle High, Partner at Sullivan & Cromwell. We also celebrated The Grace Hoadley Dodge Community Leadership Award, posthumously honoring Sarah Gund, and Emerging Leader Honoree **Donella Walker** of Con Edison, Inc. / Orange & Rockland. Thanks to the incredible generosity of our sponsors—including AllianceBernstein, Sullivan and Cromwell LLP, ConEdison Inc., Geoffrey Gund, Mary Crawford, and Alison Schweizer—and our dedicated donors, we successfully raised nearly \$400,000.

HACKATHOR

In October 2023, we were thrilled to launch our inaugural **Hackathon** at the Betterment Headquarters in Manhattan. This event brought together participants from our **Geek Girls** program with experienced technology professionals. Drawing on the skills honed in our after-school classes, students demonstrated their coding prowess and their immense creativity. Esteemed judges from the tech industry evaluated the students' innovative apps, each aimed at tackling critical social justice issues. The winning app was called "Snatch," which aimed to bridge the gap between younger individuals and job opportunities, offering a youth-friendly alternative to LinkedIn. Runners-up included "Empowered," an app for researching political candidates' stances on various issues, and "Mons," which matches users with mental health resources or social workers based on their emotional state.



GIRLS SYMPOSIUM

After a four year hiatus due to COVID-19, in honor of March History Month, YW-NYC relaunched its signature Girls Symposium, themed **A Force for the Future**, at BNY Mellon. The event brought together high school girls and gender non-conforming youth from across New York City to network and learn from 50 women leaders across various industries such as finance, media, law, and education. Attendees participated in enriching workshops that covered topics such as leadership, financial literacy, social justice, wellness, career development, and STEAAM education. We were honored to have YW-NYC alum Delgracia Sainvil as our keynote speaker; Miss New York, Taryn Delanie Smith, as our host; and Hailee Kaleem Wright providing special performances.

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
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
